Keynote:

Thinking Through Arts Education in Our Time



Kwok Kian Woon

Professor Kwok Kian Woon is Vice-Chancellor of the University of the Arts Singapore. He is also Emeritus Professor at the Nanyang Technological University, where he served as Professor of Sociology and in several pioneering roles over two decades. He was a founding member of the former School of Humanities and Social Sciences, the first Head of Sociology, Senate Chair, Associate Provost of Student Life, and Associate Vice-President (Well-being). His teaching and research areas include social theory, social memory, mental health, culture, and the arts. In addition to his writings, he has had a sustained record of intellectual engagement in civil society and public life, especially in the cultural sphere.

Rustom Bharucha

Rustom Bharucha is a writer, cultural critic and dramaturg based in Kolkata, India. He taught Theatre and Performance Studies at Jawaharlal Nehru University from 2012 to 2018 and has recently been appointed as a Corresponding Fellow of the British Academy. He obtained his doctorate from Yale University in Dramatic Criticism in 1981 and has published several books including Theatre and the World (1993) and Terror and Performance (2014). He researched the latter publication while at the International Research Center in Berlin from 2010 to 2012. He has also recently published Performing the Ramayana Tradition: Enactments, Interpretations, and Arguments (2021) and The Second Wave: Reflections on the Pandemic through Photography, Performance and Public Culture (2022).

Steve Dixon

Professor Steve Dixon is President of LASALLE College of the Arts (since 2012), and a director and performer working in theatre, film, VR and telematics. His previous academic work at Salford and Brunel Universities (UK) included devising innovative programmes, and leadership roles developing institutional strategic plans and industry research partnerships. His research focuses on new technologies in theatre and dance, and he is co-founder and Advisory Editor of International Journal of Performance Arts and Digital Media (Routledge). Steve is author of an 800-page history of Digital Performance (2007, MIT Press) and his latest book Cybernetic-Existentialism: Freedom, Systems and Being-for-others in Contemporary Arts and Performance (2020, Routledge) fuses ideas from philosophy and system sciences to critique 50 contemporary artists.





Mary Seah

Mary Seah has been at the helm of School of the Arts (SOTA) since 2019. Prior to joining SOTA, Mary has served in Tanjong Katong Girls' School, Raffles Junior College, Millennia Institute as well as the Academy of Singapore Teachers. With her experience as a music educator and school leader, Mary has shared extensively at educational platforms, and initiated a number of creative projects and networks focused on school and curriculum leadership. Since joining SOTA, Mary has led her teachers to inquire into and deepen their pedagogical and artistic practice. Her professional interests include interdisciplinary learning, cultural leadership and organisational psychology. She is a passionate advocate for the arts, particularly in how it holds much potential for negotiating complexity and uplifting humanity.

Tan-Soh Wai Lan

Mrs Tan-Soh Wai Lan was appointed President of the Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts (NAFA) in January 2021 and has since been leading the efforts to establish the academy as a founding member of the University of the Arts Singapore. Since her appointment, NAFA also saw a successful rejuvenation of its brand in 2022, achieved top 200 rankings for four consecutive years in The Straits Times Singapore's Best Employers list, and being ranked #37 in 2023. Mrs Tan joined NAFA from her appointment as Coordinating Divisional Director, Communications and Engagement Group (CEG) at the Ministry of Education (MOE). In her four years in MOE, she led and transformed the CEG to an effective and forward-thinking outfit within the Ministry known for its innovative practices, robust systems and effective strategies. Prior to that, she was Principal of CHIJ St Nicholas Girls' School (2012-2016). She had served in various roles in the education sector and received the Public Administration Medal (Silver) in 2015 for her dedication and contribution.



Peter Tornquist

Composer Peter Tornquist grew up in Sweden, Switzerland, and Brazil, settling in Norway for studies with Lasse Thoresen and concluding his education at the Royal College of Music in London with George Benjamin. He is currently the Dean of the Yong Siew Toh Conservatory of Music, National University of Singapore. His work has been performed by major orchestras around the world and focuses on the interaction between composers and performers through live electronics and improvisation. He has also contributed extensively to the development of phenomenological approaches to music analysis. In recognition of his services to music, he has been awarded Honorary Fellowships by the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and the Royal Northern College of Music.

Patrick Flores

Dr Patrick Flores is Professor of Art Studies at the Department of Art Studies at the University of the Philippines and concurrently Deputy Director at National Gallery Singapore. He is the Director of the Philippine Contemporary Art Network. He was a Visiting Fellow at the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. in 1999. Among his publications are Painting History: Revisions in Philippine Colonial Art (1999); Past Peripheral: Curation in Southeast Asia (2008); Art After War: 1948-1969 (2015); and Raymundo Albano: Texts (2017). He was a Guest Scholar of the Getty Research Institute in Los Angeles in 2014. He was the Artistic Director of Singapore Biennale 2019 and Curator of the Taiwan Pavilion at the Venice Biennale in 2022.

Cissie Fu

Dr Cissie Fu is the current Head of McNally School of Fine Arts at LASALLE College of the Arts. As a political theorist, Cissie is also the co-founder of the Political Arts Initiative which is interested in the ways in which people interact and compose political ideas and actions through technology and the arts. Born in Hong Kong, Cissie studied, taught, curated and performed across cultural and educational institutions in Asia, Europe, the UK, and the Americas and most recently as Dean of the Faculty of Culture and Community at Emily Carr University of Art + Design in Canada. Cissie's practice-led research interests in relational aesthetics and decolonial action, combined with her experiments in experiential and transformative organisational design, inform her approach to institutionbuilding as a creative, critical and communal cultural practice.





Rebecca Kan

Rebecca Kan (PhD, EdD) is an Associate Dean at Nanyang Academy of Fine Arts. She is presently holding two appointments at the Teaching & Learning Centre and Faculty of Performing Arts. Her work in academic development straddles across the visual and performing arts, involving curriculum planning to develop people and processes in higher arts education. She has spearheaded research projects, international collaborative partnerships, and pedagogical practices in the arts. Rebecca is passionate about fostering creative spaces in education through the arts, and her current research areas are in professional education, signature pedagogies, and everything in between.


Paul Lincoln






Low Cheaw T. Hwei Sasitharan

Low Cheaw Hwei is the Global Practice Lead for Product & Spatial Design and Head of Philips Experience Design and Government & Public Affairs for ASEAN Pacific. He oversees the integration of product and spatial design, driving the transformation of product and spatial experience in the digital environment. Cheaw Hwei is also an industry thought leader and frequently contributes and presents at various design and innovation forums. He is currently chairperson of the Design Education Advisory Committee (DEAC) a national-level initiative set up to push the agenda of design into the industry and education sector.

T. Sasitharan is the current Director of the Intercultural Theatre Institute (ITI), an independent actor-training school that he co-founded with late theatre doyen Kuo Pao Kun in 2000. Before ITI, Sasitharan served as the Artistic Director of The Substation (1996–2000) and as the Theatre and Visual Arts critic of The Straits Times (1988–1996). He also taught Philosophy at the National University of Singapore from 1983 to 1989. In recognition of his contributions to the arts and culture in Singapore, Sasitharan was awarded the Cultural Medallion, Singapore's highest honour for artists, in 2012 by the President. In 2022, he received the third HCS Fellow Award from the Harvard Club of Singapore.



Roger Nelson (Moderator)

Roger Nelson is an art historian and curator, and Assistant Professor of Art History in the School of Humanities at Nanyang Technological University, Singapore. He researches modern and contemporary art in Southeast Asia, with a recurrent concern on questions of historiography and method, including how they relate to gender, translation, trans-media intersections, and under-studied artists. He was previously a curator at National Gallery Singapore while teaching Art History at NUS. He was the 2022 recipient of the A.L. Becker Southeast Asian Literature in Translation Prize, awarded by the Association for Asian Studies. He is co-founder and co-editor of Southeast of Now: Directions in Contemporary and Modern Art in Asia, a peer-reviewed scholarly journal published by NUS Press.

Opening Performance

The opening collaborative performance features visuals created by LASALLE's School of Design Communication accompanied by music from NAFA's gamelan ensemble.

The first song Ladrang Wilujeng is a traditional Javanese gamelan piece, translated to mean well wishes and safety. Often performed as a greeting, this performance conveys the intent of well wishes and blessing to all present.

The second song *Ladrang Semula* is a contemporary piece structured

in three parts, beginning with a gentle introduction that builds into a traditional ladrang structure to symbolise how a new journey can start on a note of uncertainty, but with time and space, develop to embody a unique identity. The energetic middle section portrays the youthful energy and vigour generated by progress, culminating in a reprise of the traditional form as a tribute to our roots and heritage.
